


Learning Project WEEK 4- Animals

Age Range: Reception/Y1 ~ Class 1

Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Watch a Numberblocks clip each day at: [BBC](#) or [CBeebies](#). Use this guide [here](#) to give you ideas on what to do with your children whilst watching an episode.
- Play this counting [game](#). Count how many of each animal you can see.
- Practise counting backwards from 20. This can be done through playing hide and seek, singing number songs, chanting, board games etc.
- Use the 'Tens Frames' or 'Five Frames' on this [game](#) and practise recognising amounts. - Can you connect the numbers in the correct order? Write a variety of numbers ranging 0-20 and get your child to correctly order the numbers by drawing a line to each number.

Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Read a variety of books at home. Favourites can be repeated. Hearing the patterns of language in a story will support your child's language development.
- Reception age children: Children to read to parents daily. Visit Oxford Owl for free eBooks that link to your child's book band. You can create a [free account](#). Complete the linked Play activities for each book.
- With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for the Red Words they are currently learning. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.
- Get your child to pick their favourite 'animal themed' story book and share it on Tapestry. Let me know why it is your favourite.

Year One Challenges ~

- Can you read fiction, non-fiction and poems about animals? There are lots of books that you can read for free [here!](#) In your 'Love Reading Journal', write the title and explain what they best part of the text was and why.
- Can you find adjectives in the books used to describe the animal? Copy these words into your homework book, with the title in your neatest handwriting.

- Create a bookmark with animal facts on. Can you illustrate the bookmark with pictures of animals on them as well?

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Look around your house and go on a number hunt. How many items can you find that have numbers on them? What is the largest number you can find? What is the smallest number you can find? Can you write the numbers in your homework book and order the numbers from smallest to largest by drawing lines to each of them? Then play this game for ordering numbers. • Practise learning about money by playing this game. You could also use real coins and play a similar game with family members. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sing Nursery Rhymes and songs together. Add in actions and change the words. Can children think of different rhyming words to add in? Repeat old favourites and learn new rhymes. You can find an A-Z of Nursery Rhymes here. What animal themed ones can you come up with? • Daily Speed Sounds Sessions are being streamed live on Youtube by Ruth Miskin. Reception children now need to recap and become secure in reading and writing set 1 sounds. Once you are secure you can move on to set 2 sounds. Year 1 now need to recap on set 2 and become secure in reading and writing set 2 and set 3 sounds. • Daily Phonics: Focus sounds: oy (toy for a boy)- -Fred talk: b-oy, t-oy, e-n-j-oy children blend. -Write words for children to read: joy, boy, toy encourage the children to spot the special friends. -Write alien words for the children to read: thoy, foyb, doyt encourage children to spot special friends. -Children practice writing 'oy' use sound mat to support handwriting patter. -Fred talk words for children to write, encourage them to show Fred Fingers (tell them how many sounds are in the word), get them to pinch the sounds and then write the word. Words for writing: boy, toy, joy 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Draw an animal of your choice. Label the parts of the animal. Reception children could create a fact file e.g. where does it live? What does it eat? • Practise name writing. Can they write their first name? Middle name? Surname? • Practise forming the letters of the alphabet. Remember to encourage your child to start their letter at the correct starting point. • Can your child spot the missing Red words in these sentences? Write them in their Home learning book, leaving a space for them to write the correct Red Word. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Who will help _____ plant _____ corn? - Not ____ said _____ dog. - Who will help _____ cut _____ corn? - Not ____ said _____ cat. - Who will help _____ bake _____ bread? - Not ____ said _____ pig. <p><u>Year one Challenges ~</u></p>

Encourage the children to tick and fix.

Follow this format for each focus sound.

Focus sound: v

v words for blending, reading and writing: vet, van, vat, vest

Alien words: ven, vim, veeth

Focus sound: Sh

sh words for blending, reading and writing: sharp, shout, shark, shell, sheet

Alien words: shirp, pash, wesh

Focus sound: ay (may I play)

ay words for blending, reading and writing: say, play, day, clay, ray, way, pay

Alien words: payp, kayg, layh

Focus sound: z

z words for blending, reading and writing: zoo, zig, zag, zip.

Alien words: zeed, zaf, zim

Focus sound: ee (what can you see)

ee words for blending, reading and writing: sleep, teeth, feed, feet, beep, peep, deep.

Alien words: heek, deet, leep

- Using each focus sound could you pick a word and put it into a caption/sentence? Remember clear fingers spaces.

- Sing the song, 'Old McDonald Had a Farm'. Instead of saying the name of the animal, make the sound. Can your child figure out which animal it is? Reception age children could write the digraphs/ trigraphs they can hear in the song e.g. ee, igh, ee, igh, ow or write down the animals.

- A-Z Animal list: Can you think of an animal for each letter of the alphabet. Can you add sound buttons and digraph/trigraph lines to the words that you have written? *Look [here](#) if you're not sure about sound buttons! This is also a useful link to help you - <https://www.ruthmiskin.com/en/find-out-more/parents/>.
- Draw a picture of your animal and label it. Can you write sentences about the animal you have drawn using adjectives? E.g. The Zebra has black strips and spikey hair.
- In your homework book write a set of questions about animals you would like to find out about.
- Create a fact file about your favourite animal in your homework book. Research an animal of your choice and explore the vocabulary required to describe them.
- Describe similarities and differences between animals. Could you choose one that lives in a hot place and one that lives somewhere cold? How have they adapted to where they live?

Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about key animals they are interested in. Learning may focus on exploring the physical aspects of an animal, their habitat, categorising animals etc.

- **Read the story, [‘Dear Zoo’](#) or watch the online video -**
 - Visit the book’s website and play the [interactive games](#)
 - Add your own animal into the story and label it e.g. So they sent me a...hedgehog, but he was too prickly....so I sent him back.
 - Choose a soft toy animal or small animal figure and create a junk modelled container for it.
- **Identify the birds in your garden-**
 - Use the [RSPB](#) bird identifier website
 - Draw a picture of the birds you can see.
 - Could you make a bird feeder using left over fruit etc? Remember the ones we made in school.
- **Play animal charades-**
 - Take it in turns to act as different animals. Add in noises as a clue...
- **Learn the song, [‘The Animals Went in Two by Two’](#)**
 - Ask your child to draw out two of each animal and practice writing the numeral 2.
- **Looking after your pet-**
 - If you have a pet at home encourage your child to take part in their daily care. They could help feed, groom and clean up after your pet.
 - Draw a picture of your pet and add labels.
- **Big and small animals-**
 - Draw as many big animals as you can on one piece of paper and as many small animals as you can on another sheet of paper. Some children may be able to write a list as an alternative.
- **Find all of the animal books in your house-**
 - Ask your child to look through the books in your house and to find any with animals on the front cover. Ask them to sort the books into groups of their choice e.g. animals that can fly, swim, big, small, live on a farm/ at the zoo.
- **Create an animal den-**
 - Provide your child with blankets and sheets to make an animal den. Act out being an animal in the den.
