'What Are Our Roots?'

Adventures in Learning

Drawing on all that we know about 'Nature Deficit' in childhood and what it means for the development of **our youngest learners**, We have centred all the learning in the past term around what it means to enjoy a childhood rooted in nature. The children have been wild, muddy, adventurous, imaginative and thoughtful as they have explored the great outdoors both in school and beyond. This Enquiry was rounded off with an exciting trip to The Lost Gardens of Heligan – and we couldn't have asked for better weather. Inspired by The Mud Maiden and landmarks around the garden, the Class 1 children are now writing their own Mud Maiden Stories.



What if we could go on a journey and tell the story of each step of that journey using found objects along the way. What if each object served as a memory of being in the moment and enjoying one of the most spectacular areas of outstanding natural beauty in Cornwall. What if this place was secret and hidden – and filled with wonder! Not only have our **Class 2 children** experienced outdoor learning every Friday through maths, geography, orienteering and art, but they also visited the incredible St Nectan's Kieve. Their journey was punctuated with all sorts of magical experiences including making a journey stick and looking for Minpins. Back in class, their artwork, drama and writing have been enriched so much by their real experiences in nature. We are constantly looking for ways to improve our school grounds and the provision for the children. As part of our commitment to enriching playtimes and lunchtimes, and also in a move to ensure children are maximising the opportunities given to be active and healthy, our PTFA have agreed to fund a range of outdoor gym equipment which can be enjoyed by everyone throughout different times of the day.

The Egyptologists of Class 3 have really loved their quest to discover the truth behind Howard Carter's expedition to discover the Tomb of Tutankhamun. They have journeyed back in time to sample some of the extraordinary moments of his discovery whilst questioning the motivations behind some of his actions. As part of their journey of discovery back to the roots of civilisation, they have relived these moments and capture them in a bound book – all hand made and something to be cherished for years to come.

Having traced the family history of some mining families from Boscawell Terrace in Pendeen, using the census and their historical enquiry skills, the **children of Class 4** have stepped into the shoes of the Geevor mining community and really examined how their Cornish culture is rooted in mining where the land meets the sea in this most dramatic of landscapes. What a hard



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life it was – and so relentless. In order to really experience this, they visited Geevor and went down the mines, spoke to ex miners and experienced ‘the Dry’ exactly as it was left on the last day of the mine. The men were given little warning and they walked away from their jobs into an uncertain future. The room remains frozen in time and is an eerie snapshot of that historical moment.

Whatever the learning, it has been bound up in the best of books and will continue to be as we begin to plan exciting learning for next term.

Up and coming events

This year, World Book Day coincides with St Piran’s Day on Thursday 5th March.

The theme for the day will be the stories and poems of Lewis Carroll. The children will be asked to come into school in school uniform but come wearing a hat to wear to our ‘Mad Hatter’s Lunchtime Party’. If parents turn up with hats too, that will be a bonus! The hall will be transformed, and the children will spend at least part of the day sharing poems and extracts of stories by this most inventive of writers. We hope to be dazzled by the hats and to have some fun with it. A proper invitation from the Mad Hatter himself will be circulated after half term.



Parent’s Evenings

Just an early ‘heads up’ to secure the date. Our Spring parent evenings will take place on Tuesday 17th and Wednesday 18th March. The focus will be on pupil progress and actually looking at your child’s work with them so do please bring them along. It is important that they are part of the conversation around their learning. Parents of children with additional needs need not sign up for parent’s evenings as they will have a longer appointment with Mrs Dingle and their child’s teacher. This will be arranged via the office.

‘Kiss and Drop’

Now that our youngest children in Early Years and Year 1 are settled into school routines, we would like to request that parents help us to grow on their independence in the mornings at drop off. The children know exactly what is expected of them and staff are keen to settle them for the registers and early learning slots – even before the start of assembly at 9:10am. This is often the time when Tas catch individual readers. Please could parents say their lovely goodbyes away from the class lines in the playground, so that children can focus on the staff and be confident about leading in. If you need to get a message to the class teacher, the office will relay it without fail. Often, if a teacher is spoken to as they move a class of children, they have no time to make a note and there is the risk that a message can get forgotten. They will be happy to meet with you at the end of the day if need be.

Attendance Update

At our most recent attendance review, we were delighted to see that our attendance figure for year to date stands at 96.1% which is just on the DfE target. This is great news for our school and testimony to all the shared dialogue around absence and making sure that children are in school provided they are well enough. Our commitment is to now sustain this as it means that only 4% of our children are regularly not attending, and are therefore potentially not making the progress they could. Something worth considering – especially if you have a child in Foundation or KS1: Every day that your child misses school, is a new phoneme that has been missed! This mean that they will carry forward a phonic gap which we will

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need to plug in order to ensure they are confident with their reading and writing. Thank you to every parent who is working with us to make sure that this does not happen.

Coats in School

Please could all parents ensure that their children are wearing a coat to school. They will go outside for play and learning even on the coldest of days.
